Verse 20 gives us a great question to consider. Paraphrased, it says this, "Son, since you may legitimately enjoy the pleasures of a good wife's love, why would you want to take a chance on missing out on that by getting involved in sexual sin that has the potential to mess up your whole life?" Reflection
